Department of Cannabis Control Annual Report 2024

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Executive Summary

Business and Professions Code section 26190 established annual reporting requirements for the Department of Cannabis Control (Department). Beginning March 1, 2023, and annually thereafter, the Department must prepare and submit to the Legislature an annual report on activities within the Department for the prior fiscal year.

The report also provides updated data about the Equity Fee Waiver and Deferral Program for the prior fiscal year.

Finally, the enclosed report includes the Department's responses pursuant to the Budget Act of 2022, under the Business, Consumer Services and Housing Item 1115-102-0001, which requires, beginning in 2023, and until 2026, the Department to provide a report on the Cannabis Local Jurisdiction Retail Access Grant Program.



Annual Report

As required by section 26190 of the Business and Professions Code and Item 1115-102-0001 of the Budget Act of 2022, the Department submits the following information regarding its activities. This report contains the required information and data for the prior fiscal year, July 1, 2022 to June 30, 2023.

(a) The amount of funds allocated and spent by the department for cannabis licensing, enforcement, and administration.

The Department allocated \$173,623,000 for cannabis licensing, enforcement, and administration and expended \$134,578,000.

(b) The number of state licenses issued, renewed, denied, suspended, and revoked by state license category.

- Issued: 1,433 licenses
- Renewed: 10,272 licenses
- Denied: 0
- Suspended: 12 licenses
- Revoked: 1 license

(c) The average time for processing state license applications by state license category.

- Cultivation Licenses: 258 days
- Manufacturing Licenses: 190 days
- Distribution Licenses: 215 days
- Testing Laboratory Licenses: 964 days
- Retailer Licenses: 162 days
- Microbusiness Licenses: 198 days
- Event Organizer Licenses: 96 days
- Temporary Cannabis Event Licenses: 107 days

The average times provided above are impacted by a number of external and internal factors, including, but not limited to: delays in responding to Department inquiries by applicants missing necessary documentation to meet annual license application requirements, verifying the accuracy of records submitted by applicants, and correspondence with other local and state entities to ensure compliance of statutory and regulatory requirements. Average licensing processing times are also impacted because many applicants do not produce all required documentation in a



timely manner, creating significant delays in the application process. These factors, as well as a host of other factors, can impact the time it takes to approve a license. The Department notes that the processing of a backlog of over 6,000 applications from the previous reporting period (July 12, 2021 – June 30, 2022) also impacted processing times during this reporting period.

Testing laboratory applications are a notable outlier given the complexity of the license review process due to the requirement for a testing laboratory to submit complete standard operating procedures and method validations that meet regulatory testing standards.

(d) The number of appeals from the denial of state licenses or other disciplinary actions taken by the department and the average time spent on these appeals.

- Appeals from the denial of a state license: 0
- Other disciplinary actions: 1
- Average time spent on appeals: Approximately 25 hours of Department staff time were spent on an appeal by an unlicensed cultivator.

(e) The number of complaints submitted by citizens or representatives of cities or counties regarding licensees, provided as both a comprehensive statewide number and by geographical region.

The Department received 5,587 complaints statewide.

(f) The number and type of enforcement activities conducted by the department and by local law enforcement agencies in conjunction with the department.

Since the Department consolidated in July 2021, our Enforcement Division has seized over \$1.6 billion worth of product from the illegal marketplace and has significantly expanded law enforcement actions, with an over 98 percent increase from the previous fiscal year.

The Enforcement Division also led and assisted in the service of 386 search warrants. As a result of these actions, a total of 358,335 pounds of untested cannabis product was seized, which included the eradication of 658,244 plants, worth an estimated retail value of \$593,283,003. In addition, these search warrant operations resulted in the seizure of 152 firearms (up 57



percent from the prior fiscal year), 107 arrests, and the seizure of \$909,867 in cash.

Of these, the Department was the lead agency in 222 of these operations. In the Department-led operations, a total of 204,585 pounds of cannabis was seized, 360,468 plants were eradicated, 67 firearms were seized, and 26 arrests were made. The total estimated retail value of the seized product and plants was \$338,651,553. Of the remaining 164 operations in which the Department assisted, a total of 153,751 pounds of cannabis was seized, 297,776 plants were eradicated, 85 firearms were seized, and 81 arrests were made. The total estimated retail value of the seized product and plants was \$254,631,450.

The Compliance Division assisted in the service of 118 search warrants to support local or state law enforcement address unlicensed cultivation activity. These actions resulted in 22,531 pounds of cannabis product seized and 156,842 plants seized. The total estimated value of the seized product and plants was \$166,570,800.

(g) The number, type, and amount of penalties, fines, and other disciplinary actions taken by the department.

Through a progressive approach to compliance, the Department imposes penalties and fines for licensee noncompliance.

During the annual reporting period, the Department issued the following:

- Letter of Warning: 47
- Notice to Comply: 1,992
- Administrative Citation: 5 with associated penalty amounts totaling \$171,000
- Embargoes: 45
- Voluntary Condemnation and Destructions: 106
- Mandatory Recall: 0

(h) The number of licenses on which the department imposed conditions and the categories of conditions imposed on licenses.

The Department did not impose conditions upon any licenses.

(i) A detailed list of the petitions for regulatory relief or rulemaking changes received by the department from licensees requesting modifications of the enforcement of rules under this division.



The Department did not receive any petitions for adoption, amendment, or repeal of a regulation pursuant to Government Code section 11340.6.

- (j) A list of interstate cannabis agreements entered into pursuant to Chapter 25 (commencing with Section 26300), including information regarding the terms and conditions of each agreement, the activities undertaken by state agencies to implement the agreement, and the effects of the agreement on California’s cannabis industry.**

There are currently no interstate cannabis agreements to report.

- (k) The number of licensees awarded an equity fee waiver or deferral and the amount of money spent.**

Equity businesses in California may be eligible for a license fee waiver or deferral from the Department if they meet certain criteria. To be eligible, individuals must satisfy the statewide equity criteria, which allows businesses to qualify through ownership, cannabis convictions or arrests, household income, or by living in an area disproportionately impacted by the War on Drugs. Applicants may also be eligible if they are locally verified as an equity business and attest that they too satisfy the criteria set forth in the statewide definition.

Equity fee waivers became available to applicants and licensees in January 2022 and fee deferrals became available in January 2023. The Department awarded the following fee waivers and deferrals:

- 1,343 fee waivers have been awarded, as well as 128 fee deferrals.
- At the beginning of the fiscal year, \$18,679,988 was available for equity fee waivers and \$14,906,227 was spent. At the end of the fiscal year, there was \$3,773,761 remaining funds.

Please note that at the time of publishing this report, the funds for equity fee waivers are nearly exhausted, and the Department anticipates issuing the last fee waivers by March 2024. Eligible equity applicants and licensees may continue to apply for fee deferrals.

- (l) The 2022 Budget Act, Item 1115-102-0001, the Cannabis Local Jurisdiction Retail Access Grant Program. Initial funding for this program must be allocated by June 20, 2023. Once funding is allocated, the Department must report on the (1) Information on the amount of funds allocated to local jurisdictions, (2) how the local jurisdiction plans to utilize the funds, (3) the progress, if applicable, of local cannabis retailer licensing programs and the number of retailers**



permitted in the local jurisdiction, and (4) the number of equity licensee retailers operating within the local jurisdiction.

The Cannabis Local Jurisdiction Retail Access Grant Program (Grant Program), pursuant to the 2022 Budget Act, Item 1115-102-0001, dedicates \$20 million in funding for local jurisdictions that do not currently have a local cannabis retail licensing program.

The Department has issued two sets of Grant Guidelines outlining eligibility and scoring criteria for each Phase. The Phase I and Phase II Grant Guidelines are available on the Department's website.

(1) Information on the amount of funds allocated to local jurisdictions

In Phase I, up to \$10 million in initial grant funding was available for eligible local jurisdictions to develop and implement a cannabis retail licensing program. The Department began accepting applications for Phase I of the grant program on March 10, 2023, and the application process closed on April 28, 2023.

During the Phase I application period, the Department received 20 applications from local jurisdictions for grant funding. One jurisdiction withdrew their application prior to the close of the application period, and one jurisdiction was deemed ineligible because it had an existing retailer licensing program.

On June 20, 2023, the Department awarded a total of \$4,145,000 to 18 local jurisdictions to develop and implement local cannabis retailer licensing programs. Grant funding was awarded based on the population size of the jurisdiction and whether a jurisdiction was proposing equity assistance. Of the 18 jurisdictions, 14 selected for awards proposed equity programs to support and assist the licensure of cannabis equity retail businesses, a critical component to further equity in the legal cannabis market. Of the \$4,145,000 awarded, \$870,000 was awarded as equity bonus funding to be used for the benefit of equity applicants and licensees.

To date, three jurisdictions have withdrawn their application post-Phase I award. The City of Buena Park informed the Department that they would not be moving forward with the grant because its city council indicated that there were several other priorities they wanted to focus on. The Huntington Beach City Council voted 4-3 against adoption of the draft resolution to accept the award. Similarly, Lodi City Council indicated they were pursuing other priorities and did not plan to move forward with a cannabis retail program. Therefore, the grant awards for these



jurisdictions, totaling \$915,000, were withdrawn. This brought the total Phase I award amount down to \$3,230,000.

(2) How local jurisdictions plan to utilize the funds

Phase I awardees will use grant funding to draft and adopt ordinances to allow the establishment of cannabis retail businesses within the jurisdiction, hire staff and contractors, hold community outreach and engagement events, survey local populations, form stakeholder workgroups or technical advisory committees, conduct economic studies and environmental reviews, develop application forms and online application portals, and process and issue cannabis retail licenses.

Equity funding will be used by jurisdictions to conduct equity assessments, establish local cannabis equity programs, develop infrastructure to support and prioritize equity applicants, provide financial assistance to equity applicants and licensees in the form of fee waivers and deferrals, provide translation services, and provide technical assistance, such as legal and financial guidance assistance, with local and state applications and compliance training.

(3) The progress of local cannabis retailer licensing programs and (4) the number of retailers and equity retailers permitted in the local jurisdiction

The Department is currently in the process of developing grant agreements with local jurisdictions. In future reports, after grant agreements are in place and allocated grant funding has been disbursed, the Department will be able to provide specific information on the progress of local cannabis retailer licensing programs and the number of retailers and equity retailers permitted in each local jurisdiction.

Explanations of disciplinary actions



Explanations of Disciplinary Actions

A Letter of Warning is issued to a licensee when the Department has direct or indirect evidence that the licensee is violating statute or the regulations. The document is used to warn licensees that they will face disciplinary action if they continue with activities that are in violation with statute or regulation. The Department encourages licensee compliance through education and outreach.

A Notice to Comply is issued to the licensee to address violations identified during an inspection or investigation. These notices can require that a licensee provide the Department with a written corrective action plan to address violations and the Department develops a timeline for which a licensee must correct any identified violations. If this timeline is not met, the Department may take disciplinary action.

An Administrative Citation is issued to notice and document a violation and can contain monetary fines and/or abatement orders. The Administrative Citation can be used independently or in conjunction with an embargo, suspension, or other disciplinary or enforcement action. Citations are generally used as part of the progressive discipline process, in cases where the licensee has been unsuccessful in correcting identified deficiencies within the allotted time frame required in a Notice to Comply. However, the Department may move directly to a citation depending on the severity of a violation.

An Embargo is a tool used to prevent the movement or disposal of cannabis and cannabis products while an investigation is underway. At the point an embargo is placed, the Department only needs to have probable cause to believe the cannabis or cannabis products placed under embargo are adulterated or misbranded or the sale would otherwise be in violation of the Act or the regulations.

A Voluntary Condemnation and Destruction is when the licensee or owner of the cannabis or cannabis product (product owner) voluntarily chooses to destroy cannabis and/or cannabis product subject to an embargo.
